

Field Trips and Events

Program for Wednesday, April 9th Regular Meeting: I am pleased to announce that our guest speaker for this month is **Derek Yoost. The topic for the meeting is: "Who Dung It" The Science of Fossil Coprolites.** The lecture will be on the science of coprolites and who did them (anywhere from the smallest insect to the biggest dinosaurs and everything in between). Most of us are familiar with the animals that are involved, but we don't ever think about what comes out the other end. The study of coprolites is very important because it represents a time when these long extinct creatures were alive. You can tell what they ate and

how their digestive systems worked and other information. We will also meet some of the various Paleontologists that study this enigmatic material.

Field Trips:

Edelman Fossil Park and Museum, Grand Opening Weekend, March 29th and 30th and Grand Opening Month: Go to EFM.org and sign up for notifications. There are several members of DVESS that will continue as volunteers or employees at the park and museum. The ribbon-cutting ceremony was exciting, and Ric & Jean Edelman, Ali Houshmand and Dr. Ken Lacovara gave short

speeches. A Pterodactyl, T-Rex and Prof Mascot were all in attendance. 1,000 people attended opening day, 1,400 people attended on Sunday and much smaller crowds attended each day this week. It was an exciting event to be part of. Drones were flying all over taking video of the opening day festivities.



Centralia, PA, Saturday April 19th - The meeting place is the May's Drive-In (diner) 2105 Central St., Ashland PA at 10:00am, please do not be late. Centralia, PA was a small coal mining community in central PA that had to be abandoned after the coal beds under it caught fire in the 1960's. Today nothing is left but the streets and sidewalks and some cemeteries. The surrounding area has several strip mines with numerous plant fossils. These are typical Llewelyn formation fossils, some of which are coated with pyrophyllite like the famous St Clair fern fossils. In addition to fern foliage and seeds there are also lepidodendron (scale tree) fossils including roots, stems, foliage and cones. Preservation and detail is good. Collecting is typical for plant fossils, splitting relatively soft shale with a hammer and chisel. There will be a half mile walk from the parking area to the collecting area. The terrain is very steep in places with rock faces of 20 to 40 feet and collecting in the scree at the bottom so a degree of fitness and comfort moving around loose rock is required. There are no facilities at the site.

New Ringgold, PA Borrow Pit in East Brunswick Township, PA for Devonian Fossils in the Mahantango Formation, April 26th: This site is about an hour and forty-minute drive from the Philadelphia area. Meet at 10:00 AM at site. It is east of New Ringgold, Schuylkill County, PA on State Rt 895. It is a borrow pit/quarry owned by East Brunswick Township.

Earth Day Celebration with Gloucester County Parks & Recreation at Red Bank Battlefield, Sunday, April 27th from 11:00 am to 4:00 pm: We will be displaying many fossils and minerals we have personally collected and will be having children paint rocks or color pictures of dinosaurs.

C.K Williams aka Easton Site, Saturday, May 3rd: Once again, we have been invited to join North Jersey Mineralogical Society (NoJMS) and Friends of Mineralogy NJ Chapter (FM-NJ). We will meet at a meeting location where we can carpool with others. The plan is to meet 9:45 at Jay R. Snyder Memorial Park at Eddyside Beach or at the site. Serpentine, asbestiform minerals and various micas, pegmatite bodies present with feldspar, quartz, micas, schorl, titanite and associated minerals. Some radioactive minerals are present.

Ramanessin Creek Marine Fossil trip. Stay tuned for details for May 10th 2025. This site is about an hour and fifteen minute drive from the Philadelphia area. Meet at 9:30 AM at Village Elementary School parking lot (67 McCampbell Rd., Holmdel, NJ 07733). It's a creek with a steep bank to get down (4 ft. or so). Equipment – knee-high boots or hip waders, ¼ inch screen, long handled shovel, collecting bags, water, and snacks. You may want to bring an extra set of clothes for the ride home. It is a Cretaceous site with collectors finding sharks' and fish teeth. Other invertebrate material can be found. An occasional mosasaur tooth and dinosaur material has been found. Indian artifacts can also be found.


