## **Field Trips and Events**

#### Outings

**Chestnut Branch Creek, Sewell, NJ Saturday, July 27<sup>th</sup>:** We had to postpone our Mt. Pleasant Mills trip until the temperatures cooled off to more reasonable temperatures and humidity. We chose a nearby site in which we could cool ourselves off in a streambed while collecting fossils. It was another hot morning but more reasonable humidity levels. We had the following members and guests out collecting marine fossils: Karen & Rick Sweeten with grandson Phen (4), Nancy Kuntzleman with grandson Parker (14), Olga Shorokhova, Jenny Mulligan, Mark Breen-Klein with friend Bob, Fred Hochkile, John Arsenault and myself. Everyone found belemnites, Exogyras and a few ammonite pieces. Olga found part of a Mosasaur tooth and a few small shark teeth. A good time was had by all. Jenny and I had a good conversation with Bill, a local member of the historical society.

**Fellowship of the Rock, Saturday, August 3<sup>rd</sup> Freehold, NJ:** Fred Hochkile and I attended a picnic at KC Dalby and his wife Betsy's place, with fellow members of the Friends of Mineralogy North Jersey Group. John was supposed to come too but he had vehicle problems. We got to

see KC's 500 plus specimens of fluorites from around the world (see photos in newsletter). We ate hamburgers and hot dogs with assorted potato and macaroni salads and baked beans. Other members brought specimens to sell or swap. They were a little rich for me and Fred. We made several new friends. We shared stories of collecting sites and promised to invite them to some of our future trips. We thank Dave Shapiro (Groundhog Dave) for the invite to enjoy some fellowship with some fellow rockhounds.

**Micro-Fossil Gathering, Sunday, August 4<sup>th</sup> Harleysville, PA:** Fred Hochkile and I were invited to join Tom McKeeman and Matt Okasinski, fellow Delaware Valley Paleontological Society members, at a Microscopic Get-Together. We brought some of our micro-fossils from Vincentown and Chestnut Branch Creek, sieved them and placed them on special paleontological microscope slide to look at what we found. Tom and Matt provided microscopes for us to view the micro-specimens. Matt also shared micro-fossil material from a Devonian reef formation from Michigan. We were able to see micro- corals, shells, ostracods and many really neat things. We even saw a micro shark tooth. It's another aspect of mineral and fossil collecting you might be interested in. I myself have 15,000 micro-mount mineral specimens and now I may start preparing micro-fossils. If you think you might be interested in this really small side of things, let me know. You may not be able to get a whole crystal or a whole fossil on a large scale, but you will have a greater chance of seeing those on as a micro-specimen. #### **August Speaker**

**Speaker for August 14<sup>th</sup> Regular Meeting: Our speaker will be Dean Ruocco. Dean will be discussing the "Fossils of the Mahantango Formation in Pennsylvania.** Dean is a 17-year-old rising senior at Upper Dublin High School. He has dedicated himself to collecting and understanding Pennsylvania's vast Paleozoic faunas and their implications on stratigraphic

correlation. He has been collecting Eurypterid fossils since he was seven. He has always been interested in paleozoic arthropods, and at a young age, fell in love with eurypterids. He started his own fossil company at fourteen and began to collect eurypterids extensively in New York, Pennsylvania, and Ontario. Dean has had many lucky opportunities to befriend great eurypterid collectors, such as the late Samuel Cirurca and Allan Lang. He has amassed a large collection of Upper Silurian and Lower Devonian Eurypterids from across the world, with a focus on the northeastern United States.

#### **Future Trips:**

**Summer Trip to Herkimer Mountain, Rome/Johnstown, NY:** September timeframe to collect Herkimer Diamonds. We need at least 12 people to make the trip happen. The cost is \$100 per person/day. This would also require an overnight stay. Please sign up if you think you might be interested at our regular meeting.

**Dinosaur Park in Laurel Maryland: TBD:** We are gathering a list of volunteers who would be interested in working at a dinosaur site. Pleasant Mills, PA site to collect Calcite, Celestine, Strontianite, Fluorite, Wavellite and even fossils just to name a few. We will be meeting at the quarry at 10:00 am. Please sign up if you are interested in attending this trip at the regular meeting. You'll need different types of hammers and chisels, buckets, safety goggles, gloves, paper to wrap up your specimens, water, snacks, lunch and sun block.
