There are a number of events listed in the Shows and Events section, which goes into greater detail, such as the Paleopalooza at the Academy of Natural Sciences; Rutgers Geology Open House-Rock sale, lecture series, and kid activities at the Geology Museum; and the Fossil Fair/Mineral Show at LuLu Temple in Plymouth Meeting to name just a few. We are going to continue taking at least one collecting trip a month once the weather becomes nicer out. Trips will not be cancelled due to lack of interest. If we only have a small contingent of members going on a given trip, it just makes it easier to carpool. Once club members see the good material those going on trip are finding, maybe they will go the trip next time. We plan on going back to the Sayreville Amber and Marcasite site, Big Brook and Ramanessin Creek for marine fossils, the Phoenixville Brookdale and Chester County lead mines for pyromorphite as well as many new and old localities that the club hasn't been to in decades. We will also have an opportunity to volunteer again for the Edelman Fossil Park at Rowan University Community Dig Day event. We have been setting up a fossil/mineral display for the last five years and we need some volunteers to help man the table. This is a hot event, it usually fills up in less than twenty minutes. Last year 1,600 people signed up in approximately 20 minutes. This is an opportunity for the club to act as a resource in the field of geology and earth science to teachers, scout leaders and others of all ages.

We also have our annual "Super Digg" at the Franklin Mineral Museum the last weekend in April. This is our biggest fund raising activity for the year. We need volunteers to make this event work. Look for sign-up sheets at the regular meeting on January 10<sup>th</sup>. We will need 12 to 15 volunteers to make things run smoothly. Last year we had collecting in the Buckwheat Mine Dump as well as an area of special material from the former mine site for a premium fee.


