

hamburgers and hotdogs are provided by the club. We ask

that people bring side dishes and salads, snacks and refreshments to share. We will have initial sign-up sheets at the regular meeting on Wednesday, July 9th. We encourage everyone to sign up, indicate how many are coming from your family and tell everyone what you are bringing to eat, so we don't wind up with ten plates of brownies. We'll be sending out an email asking for people to sign up for what they are bringing and how many are coming. When you answer hit reply all. That way everyone sees what you are bringing. We need to know how many hotdogs, hamburgers and beverages to purchase. Bring specimens for the club auction and bring plenty of money so you can bid on many items at our auction.

Field Trips:

Chestnut Branch Fossil Trip, Saturday June 21st: This was our first time to this site so far this year. We had several members and guests attend, including: Jenny Mulligan and daughter Phoebe, Fred Hochkile, Eric Carr, Shelby Spellane, Nancy Michaelsen, Sue VanCola and myself. We found many belemnites, exogyras, and picodontes along with several types of shark teeth. The weather was hot but perfect for standing in a nice cool stream. Everyone had a excellent time.

July 12th Centralia Plant Fossils: We will be meeting at Wood Crest Station,
Parking Lot 8A at 7:30 am. Centralia, PA was a small coal mining community in
central PA that had to be abandoned after the coal beds under it caught fire in the

1960's. Today nothing is left but the streets and sidewalks and some cemeteries. The surrounding area has several strip mines with numerous plant fossils. These are typical Llewelyn formation fossils, some of which are coated with pyrophyllite like the famous St Clair fern fossils. In addition to fern foliage and seeds there are also lepidodendron (scale tree) fossils including roots, stems, foliage, and pine cones. Preservation and detail is good. Collecting is typical for plant fossils, splitting relatively soft shale with a hammer and chisel. There will be a half mile walk from the parking area to the collecting area. The terrain is very steep in places with rock faces of 20 to 40 feet and collecting in the scree at the bottom so a degree of fitness and comfort moving around loose rock is required.

August Field Trip: Possibly going to Lancaster to collect a variety of quartz crystals (rock crystal, amethyst or smokey quartz) or possible going to National Limestone Quarries.

Dinosaur Park, Laurel, MD: I will continue to take names of those that are interested in participating. They are still getting their volunteer program together. The Park is run by the National Park Service. I will keep reaching out to him every now and again.

Edelman Fossil Park and Museum: I am still trying to have a meeting there once or twice a year at the museum. I will update on the progress.

Club T-Shirts: I'm still working on a design and hope to have T-shirts by sometime in July/August timeframe.
