Water Fest 2019 at Scotland Run Nature Center and

There were live animals, live bird shows, kayak and canoeing on Wilson Lake, as well as at least 25 tables displaying exhibits on mosquitoes, birding, projects for the outdoors, wetlands protection, recycling exhibits, Pinelands protection, fossils from the Edelman Fossil Park, minerals and fossils from the DVESS. The place was packed all day. The weather also was fantastic for another weekend. Hopefully the weather will be as good when we are going on some of our field trips.



Big Brook Fossil Preserve & Ramanessin Creek: May 11th: The water levels were still a little high for Big Brook because of all the rain we received over recent months but the weather cooperated for a beautiful day. Jim, Sherry, Karen, Amy, Mike and Mark went to Big Brook first to see if collecting was any better than last fall. Jim and Mark had a discussion with a guy named Bob, who they met two years ago, who had unearthed a large sea turtle. He had been collecting bone from the same turtle for over a period of ten years. We weren't that lucky; we found mostly Belemnites and Exogyra. We then picked up and went to Ramanessin Creek where we found several small sharks teeth, bones and a vertebrae.
