President's Message

We are continuing to hold Zoom meetings for a few more months. With some of these 60-to-70-degree days that have been popping up we might be able to sneak in a trip or two. We are making plans for our spring field trips now. Please contact me should you have any ideas of localities or specimen types (fossil or minerals) you would like to visit. We are still trying to plan on taking Ralph Johnson up on his invitation to see his Upper Cretaceous Fossils of NJ at his Monmouth Amateur Paleontology Society (MAPS) museum.

Updates on the Edelman Fossil Quarry and Museum construction: It looks like the museum will open late 2023 or early 2024. and glaciation interacted and played a role in the past and future climate solutions.

<u>Classroom Visit, February 3rd at Folsom Elementary School</u>: If you remember from the last newsletter I mentioned that I had talked to a teacher who asked if I would go to her classroom and talk to her students about Geology/Earth Science. I told her that our club would love to be a resource for teachers. So, I went to Folsom Elementary School on February 3rd to talk about rock formation, the rock cycle and the three rock types. I promised to go back on February 21st to talk about fossils and fluorescent minerals.

When I arrived, the students remembered me from before and were excited watching me set up my fossil display and my surprise fluorescent mineral display. Their hands were in the air asking all types of questions about fossils, various

types of sharks and digging up dinosaur bones. They were able to touch and hold a few of the fossil specimens. It was non-stop until I left 1½ hours later. Each student got their own 65 + million-year-old Belemnitella americana collected from Chestnut Branch creek in Sewell, NJ. The last thing I did before leaving them was to show them my fluorescent mineral specimens from Franklin and Sterling Hill. I heard many



ooohs and ahhhs. None of the students had ever seen fluorescent minerals before. I handed out many brochures for Franklin Mineral Museum and the Sterling Hill Mining Museum to the students and teachers. See photos from my visit below in this newsletter. I'm already invited to come back next year.












