This 508-million-year-old sea monster had 50 legs and giant claws

Researchers discovered the first of the 21 fossil specimens in sedimentary rock in Kootenay National Park, in British Columbia, Canada, in 2012. They named the roughly 4-inch-long creature *Tokummia katalepsis*, honoring Tokumm Creek, which runs along the northern part of the park through Marble Canyon, where they found the fossils.
