## **President's Corner:**

We are working on a summer full of an exciting mix of minerals and fossils collecting trips. Below you will find several trips that are tentatively planned for the next few months. Please sign up for these trips at the regular meeting. We may also plan on a few short notice trips for scouting out sites before we plan them for a club trip. All of our trips are subject to cancellation due to severe weather conditions. We are also working on getting some interesting speakers for the second half of the year. I'm looking for volunteers to help lead field trips.

**Franklin Mineral Museum Super Diggg, Saturday, April 27<sup>th</sup>:** Friday showers and early Saturday torrential rains ended early to allow for a dry but very windy day. People were already in-line from round 7:30/8:00 getting ready for the first session at the Mill Site material. The wind was howling all day long and it was tough to get warm. People kept saying that this was the best material they had seen come out of the site in the three years of opening the Mill Site for collecting.

Well, another successful Super Diggg in the record books. This was our third year back to the Franklin Mineral Museum for our Super Diggg. Mr. Steve Phillips from the Franklin Mineral Museum promised again to turn over and spread out the Mill Site material as well as the Buckwheat Mine Dump materials. There were three sessions, each three hours at a time and a blackout tent was set up to view the materials collected. Meanwhile, others collected freshly turned over rock in the Buckwheat Mine Dump. There was a steady line all day long of people weighing out their finds. Throughout the day, there were tours of the museum, two geological tours of the Trotter Mine area, and later at night the remaining ore pillar/wall beneath High Street in the Trotter Mine was illuminated with large UV lights. This was the first time since 2006 that the wall had been illuminated. It didn't look like wall had lost any of its fluorescent ability. The walk back to the Trotter Wall was about a quarter mile down a completely dark trail at the edge of the woods where many people had gathered to take in its natural beauty.

The final numbers are in and we had:

- 137 paid collectors, about the same as last year
- 3,187 pounds of rock collected from the Mill Site
- 1,534 pounds of rock collected from the Buckwheat Mine Dump

Total pounds of rock sold doubled last years total.
