Field Trips:

September 22, 2018: Community Dig Day at the Edelman Fossil Park at Rowan University: The weather was fantastic for the greater than 1,000 people that attended the 7th Annual Edelman Fossil Park Community Dig Day. Dr. Ken Lacovara talked to each of the four groups of people eager to collect fossils from around 65 million years ago. The DVESS and DVPS both shared tables with fossils on display. Our club was well represented. Susan Moore, Jim Brennan, Lou Detofsky and I helped cover the table and passed out club brochures. Lou and I were down in the quarry helping the many guests identify their treasures. A fun time was had

September 29, 2018: Kayak Trip on Chesapeake Bay near Calvert Cliffs: Collecting fossils off beaches that we were able to gain access from the bay. The weather was beautiful, the wind and water were calm, great for kayaking. A total of six people attended; all were members of the DVPS and two of those were from DVESS. The trip was lead by Susan Vancola.

October 6, 2018: Gloucester County Educational Association Dig Day at the Edelman Fossil Park at Rowan University: Amy and I manned a table with fossil exhibits and passed out our club brochures. The event was well attended by many teachers.

Sterling Hill Mining Museum: Saturday October 13, 2018. We are planning on going up to Sterling Hill Mining Museum for our free trip. That's right, you heard it right. Maybe I am biased but I don't think there is any comparison with stamp, coin, match cover, beer can or any other type of collecting. With minerals there is one and only one kind - there are no two specimens alike. The hobby takes you out-of-doors, it is inexpensive, and is scientific because you are dealing with nature.
