Field Trips and Events

September Regular Meeting: There was no speaker. September was our "**Annual Show and Tell**" program. Some members came prepared to share with everyone their specimens/stories/photos of their summer adventures. We had a lot of great specimens and stories to go along. Special thanks to those who participated in our event.

Field Trips:

Pickering Golf Course, Saturday, September 27 th: **(Rescheduled from early June)** We made our annual pilgrimage back to the old Brookdale Mine in the area collectively known as the Wheatly Mines to collect pyromorphite, quartz, calcite, malachite, galena, silver, cerussite and sphalerite to name a few. We went back to the area immediately in front of the old smokestack. The area had been recently dug up from another club or two. I almost didn't recognize the area.

Then we went over to the new area we were shown last time. I can't say it was much better but we found quartz crystals and a few pieces of pyromorphite. A doe decided she like us and decided to lay down and watch us collect for a while. Golf balls were whizzing past our heads a few time but none of us got hit. Those who attended were Dottie Lennon, Dave & Gina Shaerer, newcomer Jeff Lux, Steve Ditullio, Fred Hochkile, other newcomers Jack Helberg & John Aruta and me. We were not allowed to rent a golf cart. The weather was cool and much different from our last adventure there when the heat index was close to 110 degrees.

Plant Fossils/Coal Mine Trip, Saturday, October 18th, Lansford, PA: This trip consists of two parts. In the morning, we will be collecting fossil ferns/plants in an active coal strip mine. In addition to fossils, minerals like quartz crystals, pyrite and peacock coal may also be found. Then, after lunch we will take a short drive to the No. 9 Coal Mine Museum and Tour. We will be able to tour the longest running coal mine in Pennsylvania and view the museum exhibits that preserve the legacy of the anthracite coal mining industry of the area. There is a fee for the No. 9 Coal Mine Museum. We need a total of 20 people to attend from all the clubs involved to get a group discount rate. I need to know if you are planning on attending by Sunday, October 5th.

We are going to meet another club up at the site at 8:45 or you can meet the group at PATCO High Speedline, Woodcrest Station, Parking Lot 8A at 6:15 sharp. We will meet at the parking lot of the No. 9 Coal Mine Museum, 9 Dock Street, Lansford PA 18232. Please be there by 8:45 am and check in with me. I have a gray Toyota pick-up truck, and I will have a green hard hat on. At that time, I will be collecting the money for the Coal Museum and Coal Mine tour later that day. We will be leaving the parking lot at 9:00 am promptly and caravaning a short distance to the Lehigh Anthracite Coal strip mine. Collecting will occur unless we have heavy rain or lightning. If the trip needs to be canceled, I will contact you by 5:00 pm the night before the trip.

Children are allowed on this trip but must be under the supervision of their guardian. Any children with behavior that is seen as unsafe for themselves and other attendees will be asked to leave. Attendees must wear a hard hat and sturdy boots with steel tips. Other recommended safety gear includes eye protection and gloves. Attendees must stay away from any vehicles and

equipment in the mine; this is an active strip mine. A safety representative from Lehigh Anthracite Company will be joining us in the mine.

We will be collecting on spoil piles of the mine, the primary focus being fern and plant fossils from the Pennsylvanian Period (318-299 million years ago). The shale we will be collecting fossils from is the Llewellyn formation, and the coal that is being mined is from many different veins and can not be identified at the spoil piles. I recommend looking up www.fossilguy.com and looking at his Carboniferous fern fossil identification page. Although the fossils from this page are from a different formation, the plant fossils from Lansford are similar. There is good pictures of ferns from the St. Clair fossil site as well. If you have a greater interest in the subject, the PA Geological Survey offered the book Fossil Plants From The Anthracite Coal Fields of Eastern Pennsylvania by John Oleksyshyn years ago and used copies of this book can still be found on Amazon. In addition to the plant fossils, you may also find quartz crystals, pyrite, and peacock coal.

You will not need large equipment to collect from the spoil piles. A hammer and chisel are the standard tools; an old screwdriver can be utilized as a chisel as well. Some collectors use putty knives or old butter knives to split shale into thinner pieces. Bring containers to put your specimens in; boxes and 5-gallon plastic pails are used by some collectors. You may want to bring newspaper to wrap your finds. Some people use aluminum foil to wrap up more delicate fossils. As with most fossil and mineral collecting, you probably are going to get dirty, so be prepared. I like to carry a container of hand wipes with me.

Collecting at the strip mine will end at 12:00 pm sharp, and for those who are staying for the No. 9 Coal Mine tour, we are taking an hour lunch break. The No. 9 Coal Mine Museum has a picnic pavilion available if you are packing a lunch. Also, if you want to share your finds from collecting, join us at the picnic pavilion. There are 2 convenience stores nearby that you can pick up something to eat: The Friendly Food Market, 135 W Patterson St, Lansford, PA, and Pappy's Mini Mart, 113 E Water Street, Coalsdale, PA. Cabrera's pizza shop, 161 W. Ridge St., Lansford, PA is close as well, just be back by 1:00 pm.

The visit and tour of the No. 9 Coal Mine Museum will start at 1:00 pm. The group entrance fee is \$10 for adults and \$8 for children aged 4 to 12. You will need to pay in cash; please have exact change. They recommend bringing a light

jacket or sweater to go into the mine, and open-toed footwear is not allowed. Check out their website, no9coalmine.com.

Possible November trips: Ramanissin Creek, Chestnut Branch Creek, Sterling Hill Mine and Museum.

Dinosaur Park, Laurel, MD: I will continue to take names of those that are interested in participating. They are still getting their volunteer program together. The Park is run by the National Park Service. I will keep reaching out to him every now and again.

Edelman Fossil Park and Museum: I am still trying to have a meeting there once or twice a year at the museum. I will update on the progress.
