NEW MEETING LOCATION FOUND commencing with the January 2006 meeting.



Field Trip Report by Thaddeus Butterstone

December 4, 2005 PCS Phosphate Pit in Aurora, NC – Four hardy and dedicated souls were willing and able to make the long trek to North Carolina for what can only be described as a fossil collecting experience deluxe. December 4th turned out to be the last collecting day of the fall season and despite being the last to scourer the grounds everyone came away with more fossils then they could carry. The volunteer guides, including club member and good friend George Powell, were exceedingly helpful and generous in sharing items that they had collected with us novice collectors. The

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weather could not have been better and it was with the greatest reluctance that we boarded the bus to leave the site at the end of the collecting day. If the club is fortunate to get slots for the spring season, I hope that more of you will be able to find the time to take advantage of this wonderful experience.

December 11, 2005 Sterling Hill Mining Museum tour and collecting – Once again only four hardy and determined members took advantage of this late season field trip opportunity. The fact that a winter storm deposited a foot of snow in the Ogdensburg, NJ area just prior to our scheduled trip, surly discouraged many from making the trip to northwestern NJ. Those of us, who did brave the weather, we were justly rewarded. We were given a VIP tour of the museums and the mine and following a short lunch break got a tour of the newly cleaned and painted tower, the conveyor enclosure span and the ore processing plant at the top of the hill. The view from tower of the mine buildings below and the valley beyond was spectacular. We were able to explore the ore processing building with if ovens for drying the ore and the crushers that converted the ore to pea size prior to sending it down the conveyor belt to the storage tower where if awaited the rail car to haul it to the smelter in Palmerton, PA. As the snow cover on the ground made collecting in the quarries impossible we were shown the last load of ore to be brought to the surface by the NJ Zinc Company which had lain forgotten in the hopper up top for over 30 years and allowed to collect from the pile which despite 30 years of dust and mine grit phosphoreseted wildly after only the briefest exposure to ultra violet light. While we regretted not being able to collect in the quarries the opportunity to pick up historically significant ore was a huge bonus. We concluded our trip with a shopping spree in the gift shop and traveled home well satisfied with our day at Sterling Hill.


